

# Maths GCSE Edexcel specification:

- 2 tiers of entry (higher and foundation)
- 3 equally weighted papers (1 non-calculator and 2 calculator papers 90 minutes each)
- Demanding content at both tiers
- A lot of emphasis on problem solving, reasoning and mathematical fluency

## How you can support as a parent is to...

- Regularly check your child is doing their homework.
- Supports learning and practice of GCSE content. Set once a week on Sparx
- Encourage use of Sparx for homework and independent learning.
- Talk to your child about their maths you do not have to understand it yourself
- Familiarise yourself with the Tiers of Curriculum on the website
- Encourage them to see their maths teacher to get help outside of lessons.
- Ensure they are equipped every day.





 Sparx is an incredible tool - it is only good if your child does the homework to best of their ability. Otherwise it will not adjust to their level.








- Two GCSEs
- 100% examination
- No coursework
- Compulsory speaking component (grade awarded separately)
- Greater focus on vocabulary, writer's techniques and sentence variety
- One paper for all abilities
- High quality reading texts which are challenging including C19th Fiction and Non-Fiction
- 5 lessons a week in Y11

#### Section C Unseen poetry:

students will answer 2 questions on unseen poems

## Main Expectations in English

- 1. <u>Students must make full use of learning time in class</u> by being fully engaged and working to best of ability, challenging themselves, asking questions and writing/note taking continuously.
- 2. <u>Students need to take full responsibility for the quality of their homework</u>, ensuring adequate time is given to English and ensuring it is purposeful and they can learn from doing it. This will take the form of pre-reading and revision activities.
- 3. <u>Students need to build their resilience and independence</u>; they can start creating revision resources now and ensuring they feel prepared for future assessments and mocks. They need to become self-reliant and ask questions, seek advice and attend any booster sessions offered to them.
- 4. In order to succeed in exams, students need to build on their <u>writing stamina</u> and not be put off by extended writing. The more writing practice they do, they better they get at it.
- 5. Finally there is no time to waste! We are here to fully support students and if they have a 'can do' attitude, they will succeed.

## What to Expect...

Some students will work hard and put full effort into the subject to achieve the best they can.

As teachers, we mark to criteria – not grades (as the grade boundaries always change) – so we continue to develop the quality of their written responses.

### Your child may:

- Be selected for a 'Booster/intervention Group' after school
- Be asked to stay behind to re-do homework or classwork
- We may call you to discuss any issues
- We will not tolerate disruption in class

Everything we do is for the benefit of our students because we know what works.

### How you can help as a parent...

- Does your son/daughter read fiction?
- Does your son/daughter watch/read the news?
- Does your son/daughter have opinions about current affairs?

Writing is worth 50% of English Language – it needs to be a priority.

Paper 1 Language Q5 (worth 25% of GCSE) requires students to write a story – the more they read, the better their vocabulary and understanding of structure is. It also helps to stimulate their own ideas.

Paper 2 Language Q5 (worth 25% of GCSE) requires students to write an opinion piece on a <u>topical issue</u> – the more they read and understand about the world and current issues, the more they will have to write about and express their views.

The reading sections (Q1-4) is more accessible if students read as it helps with their comprehension and analytical skills.

## How you can help as a parent...

- Encourage your son/daughter to read in short bursts and choose something they can engage with – any reading helps but it needs to be a work of quality literature.
- Ask them to download the BBC News or SKY News APP on their phone so they can catch up on daily news events.
- It is important they are aware of topical issues and can write an opinion piece. The more the know about the world and society, the more detailed and informed their writing will be.





Stuff that is proven to not work:

- "going over my notes"
- "I need to work harder" what does this mean?
- Using past papers exclusively to revise

Stuff that does work:

- Self-testing
- Spaced practice revise it now, practise it now and practise it later: mimics an exam
